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Your Support Needed: Advocacy for Military and Veteran Issues

In our current political landscape, the representation of military experience in our legislative bodies is notably limited. With 81 out of 435 members in the U.S. House of Representatives having military backgrounds, and none in our local districts or state representatives, the onus falls on us to educate and inform our leaders about the unique challenges and needs of our community.

As your Legislative Liaison, I urge you to join me in this crucial advocacy effort. The Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) has streamlined this process through their platform, making it easier for us to voice our concerns and support key legislative priorities for 2024. By visiting <u>MOAA's Take Action Center (https://moaa.quorum.us/)</u>, you can quickly draft and send letters to our representatives, advocating for the following important issues:

Avoid Government Shutdown and Complete Appropriations: We need to press our lawmakers to avoid a government shutdown and ensure a complete appropriations process, safeguarding the stability of our uniformed service members and their families.

Pay Service Members During Government Shutdown: It's critical to advocate for legislation that guarantees continuous pay for uniformed services members and civilian employees during government shutdowns.

Fix the TRICARE Young Adult Coverage Gap: We are campaigning to expand TRICARE eligibility to young adult dependents up to age 26, bringing it in line with commercial health plans.

Protect Veterans from Claims Sharks: Support is needed for the GUARD VA Benefits Act of 2023, which aims to reinstate penalties for unauthorized fees in veterans' disability benefits claims.

Support Concurrent Receipt: We are promoting the Major Richard Star Act, allowing combat-injured veterans to receive both their full DoD retirement pay and VA disability compensation.

Expand America's National Cemeteries: Advocating for the expansion of national cemeteries to honor more veterans.

Incentivize Military Spouse Employment: Supporting the Military Spouse Hiring Act to encourage businesses to hire military spouses.

Restore Basic Allowance for Housing to 100%: We are working to ensure service members receive their full housing allowance.

Ensure Coast Guard Pay During Shutdowns: Advocating for the Pay Our Coast Guard Parity Act of 2023 to ensure equitable treatment of Coast Guard members during government shutdowns.

Expand Health Care for Children of Disabled Veterans: Supporting the CHAMPVA Children's Care Protection Act to extend health care coverage for children of eligible veterans until age 26.

Improve Basic Needs Allowance for Military Families: Campaigning for legislation to assist military families struggling with food insecurity.

Support the READINESS Act: Advocating for policy enhancements to support military spouses employed by the federal government.

Retain Skilled Nurses in MTFs: Urging lawmakers to co-sponsor legislation to retain experienced nurses in Military Treatment Facilities.

Support the CARE Act of 2023: Aiming to standardize processes for caregiver and veteran assistance in navigating VHA programs.

Improve Survivors' Benefits: Supporting bipartisan legislation to align Dependency and Indemnity Compensation payments with other federal survivor benefits.

End the "180-day rule" for Skilled Veterans: Advocating to end the rule that delays veterans from taking certain types of DoD civilian employment after service.

Support Impact Aid Full Funding Act: Campaigning for resources to help military-connected students in schools.

Support Military Sexual Trauma Survivors: Promoting the SAVES Act to improve care and services for military sexual trauma survivors.

Support Services for Aging and Disabled Veterans: Securing funding and resources for VA home and community-based services, long-term care, and caregiver support.

Support Remarriage Legislation for Surviving Spouses: Advocating for the Love Lives On Act, allowing surviving military spouses to remarry at any age and retain benefits.

Protect Grieving Military Families: Supporting the Respect for Grieving Military Families Act to protect surviving spouses of military retirees from financial burdens.

Expand TRICARE for 'Gray Area' Retirees: Advocating for the TRICARE Fairness for National Guard and Reserve Retirees Act.

Secure Dental Care for Selected Reserve Servicemembers: Campaigning for dental care benefits for Reserve Component service members.

Protect Privacy During International Relocations: Supporting the Moving Americans Privacy Protection Act.

Your participation in these campaigns is not just a contribution; it's a testament to our ongoing commitment to the welfare and rights of our military community. A few moments of your time can lead to significant changes and improvements in the lives of those who have served and continue to serve our nation. PAYMENT OF MSVC-MOAA CHAPTER DUES
