#### THE POLAR BEARS

In the summer of 1918, President Woodrow Wilson, at the urging of Britain and France, sent an infantry regiment to north Russia to fight the Bolsheviks in hopes of persuading Russia to rejoin the war against Germany. The 339th Infantry Regiment, with the first battalion of the 310th Engineers and the 337th Ambulance and Hospital Companies, arrived at Archangel, Russia, on September 4, 1918. About 75 percent of the 5,500 Americans who made up the North Russian Expeditionary Forces. were from Michigan; of those, a majority were from Detroit. The newspapers called them "Detroit's Own,"; they marched on Belle Isle on July 4, 1919. Ninety-four of them were killed in action after the United States decided to withdraw from Russia but before Archangels harbor thawed.

## THE POLAR BEARS

In 1929 five former "Polar Bears" of the 339th Infantry Regiment returned to north Russia in an attempt to recover the bodies of fellow soldiers. who had been killed in action or died of exposure or disease ten years earlier. The group was selected by the members of the Polar Bear Association under the auspices of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The trip was sponsored by the federal government and the State of Michigan. The delegates recovered eighty-six bodies. Fifty-six of these were buried on this site on May 30, 1930. The Polar Bear monument was carved from white Georgian marble: the steps, from white North Carolina granite: The black granite base symbolizes a fortress, and the cross and helmet denote war burial.

# America War with Russia in World War I

The first luncheon meeting of the Mahoning and Shenango Valleys Chapter of Military Officers Association of America started off the New Year with 38 members in attendance at the Consolidated Activities Center of the Youngstown Air Reserve Station in Vienna. President LTC Gary Williams welcomed two new members into the Chapter – Jim Borgen and George Jarbeck along with Tom Whitten, a guest and prospective new member. After a reflective invocation by Lt Col Ralph Minton, and COL Bill Kennedy leading the Chapter in the Pledge of Allegiance, lunch was served. Following lunch, former LT Florence Hosler presented a brief synopsis of the legislative battles the military forces are facing in Congress and highlighted how we could have our voices heard by signing and mailing in the pre-printed letters found in this month's issue of the *Military Officer* magazine to our Congressional leaders of both parties.

During the course of the last several Chapter meetings members have been honored with a presentation of MOAA military branch specific lapel pins. The seven members who were presented their MOAA lapel pins were: George Jarbeck, Jim Borgen, Dennis Gartland, Harold Hutzen, Mark Andrews, Rick Williams, and Al Lind. Congratulations! Qualifications for receiving this branch specific lapel pin are membership in both the local Chapter and in MOAA national.

The guest speaker for this meeting was none other than our own Past President and history buff, LTC Rod Hosler who presented the Chapter members a very informative and entertaining slide presentation of the American Expeditionary Forces in Russia during World War I. Approximately 5000 US Army forces served with over 10,000 other Allied Forces from Australia, Britain, Canada, France, and Italy in Northern Russia from 4 September 1918 until they departed Archangel, Russia on 3 June 1919. A larger Allied Expeditionary Force of 138,990, which included additional forces from Czechoslovakia and Japan, were sent to Vladivostok, Siberia. Of this total, the United States sent 8,000 troops to Siberia. Although much smaller in number, 15,250 troops vs 138,990, the Northern Russian forces suffered over four times KIA's than did the Siberian forces - 109 vs only 27. Rod Hosler's presentation focused mainly on the Northern Russian intervention which saw a number of battles in several key towns and villages in Northern Russia. The main objectives for the Allied intervention were three-fold:

- 1. Prevent the Allied war materiel stockpiled in Archangel and Vladivostok from falling into German or Bolshevik hands.
- 2. Mount an offensive to rescue the Czech Legion, which was stranded along the Trans-Siberian Railway and to protect that vital line of communication.



3. Resurrect the Eastern Front by defeating the Bolshevik Army with the assistance of the Czech Legion and anti-Bolshevik White Russian forces.

# Legislative Issues – February 2017

A lot of excitement has been generated on the National level since our last update. A new President has been inaugurated, a new Vice President, Secretary of Defense and a new National Security team have also been installed. From a legislative standpoint, the swearing in of the 115th congress has taken center stage. No major legislative action has taken place as both parties re-align their priorities and committee assignments.

As we stated in our last update, the new President has called for increased priority be given to the military, both in manpower and in equipment. **The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act** that was signed into law is a major step in this new direction. As a review this Defense Authorization Act contained a number of MOAA priorities.

Mainly:

- Increase the pay raise for the military from 1.6% to 2.1%
- Stops the **drawdown** of forces and increases manpower levels for all branches.
- Moderate the changes to the **Military Health Care System**. Protects services members from a variety of proposed increases.
- Rejects cuts to Housing Allowance.
- Provides positive steps toward improving access to Quality Health Care for all service members and their dependents.

An outline of the **FY2017 Defense Authorization Act** is provided in the February issue of the *Military Officer* magazine. This outline is a concise picture of what was proposed by both the House and the Senate and what was finally agreed upon and enacted into law. It provides much more detail on both Health Care and non- Health Care issues. It is recommended that we all review this article to better understand what is in the Defense Authorization Act.

As we stated in our last update, the Defense Authorization Act and the Presidents' desires for the Military are going to provide a serious budget problem. The Congress has some major hurdles to overcome in order to satisfy both the Defense Act and well as the Presidents objectives. The largest hurdle of course is **SEQUESTRATION** (offsetting budget increases so as to not incur increased National Debt). The major effect of Sequestration has been felt by Defense. The actions and interactions that Congress takes should provide for great viewing. **MOAA** has made ending the SEQUESTRATION a **Major Legislative** goal for 2017.

In this month issue of the *Military Officer* are pre-printed letters to key Congressional leaders urging them to take action on SEQUESTRATION? We as members of MOAA are asked to sign, seal and mail these letters. Actions to reduce or eliminate Sequestration are necessary if we are to adopt the changes sought by the President and enacted in the Defense Act for 2017.



Changes have started to happen with this new President and his administration. How well this develops will change the course of our Nation's Direction. We as citizens have a role to play, **OUR VOICE MATTERS**. Our support of MOAA's Legislative Actions and our willingness to express our opinions on issues to our representatives are essential to our well-being as a nation.

## **Chapter Member Elected President of Ohio Council**



Colonel Dick Calta, USAF, Retired, a member of our chapter, has been elected President of the Ohio Council of Chapters of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) for 2017-2019. Installation took place on January 28, 2017 at the Defense Supply Center in Columbus, Ohio.

MOAA currently has over 370,000 members. The Ohio Council consists of seven chapters, located in Akron, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Toledo, and Youngstown. There are 1,400 chapter members in Ohio.

Colonel Calta is a native of Iowa City, Iowa. He was commissioned as an Air Force ROTC Distinguished Military Graduate. Throughout his more than 29 years of active duty he served in various logistics, aircraft maintenance, inspection, airlift support, air mobility support, quality, and readiness positions. His assignments were at flight, squadron, group, wing, and major command levels. He was twice a squadron commander, twice a chief of aircraft maintenance, and twice a group commander. Duty locations included assignments in Hawaii, Ohio, Turkey, Illinois, Virginia, Greece, Washington, and Japan.

Colonel Calta earned a BBA at the University of Iowa and an MS at the Air Force Institute of Technology in Dayton, Ohio. He has also completed Squadron Officer School, Air Command and Staff College, Aircraft Maintenance Officer Course, Armed Forces Staff College, and Air War College. His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Force Meritorious Service Medal with 5 devices, the Air Force Commendation Medal with 1 device, and the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with 3 devices.

Following his retirement from active duty Colonel Calta joined McDonnell Douglas (now Boeing). He established the depot-level maintenance requirements and frequencies for the C-17 military airlift aircraft fleet. He then became the C-17 Fleet Performance Advisor, and increased the C-17 worldwide mission and fleet capabilities. Finally, he was the Site Activation Leader; he organized, integrated, and led efforts to prepare the Air Force and Boeing for the basing of C-17 aircraft at USAF bases in Mississippi, New Jersey, California, Hawaii, Alaska, and Delaware. He retired from Boeing in 2008 and moved to Ohio.

Colonel Calta is married to the former Linda Cannon of Mapleton, Iowa. They reside in Akron and have two children, Michael Calta (Colonel, USAF, Retired), in Lithia, Florida, with his wife Larcy, and 4 grandchildren; and Mrs. Lori Smith, with her husband Chris, in Akron.



## Campbell City Schools Alumni Assoc. Salutes Chapter Member Nick Pacalo

Campbell native and Memorial High School graduate, Captain Nicholas Pacalo received his commission in 1956, through the Naval Aviation Cadet Program (NAVCAD). During his 23 years of active naval service

and two years of active reserves, Captain Pacalo served in various capacities including Aviator, Aviation Safety Specialist Program Manager, Aircraft Commander, Instructor Pilot C-130 Aircraft, and flew combat airlift missions in Vietnam. Captain Pacalo also investigated naval air crashes and made recommendations to the staff on how to avoid future accidents. His first tour of duty in safety resulted in his assignment to the Pentagon for eight years as an aviation safety advisor to the senior Navy staff in the 1970's. While at the Pentagon, he obtained a master's degree in safety from the University of Southern California. At the time USC had an MS in safety extension program located in Washington D.C. Captain Pacalo did his doctoral studies at the University of West Virginia.

When he retired from the Navy in 1979, Captain Pacalo and his family relocated to Indiana, Pennsylvania where he accepted a full-time teaching position in the safety science department of Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He served as the chairperson of the safety science department for three years retiring in 1994.

Captain Pacalo lives in Boardman with his wife, Rose. In retirement, he and his son wrote and published a manual for industry entitled *The Industrial Accident Investigation Techniques Manual*. He is a professional Member of both the American Society of Safety Engineers and the International Society of Air Safety Investigators. He is also a life member of the Military Officers Association of America and a charter member of Mahoning and Shenango Valleys Chapter which was chartered in 2012.

## MOAA's Educational Assistance Application Closing Soon

Children of military personnel whose parents are eligible for MOAA membership (officer at some point in their career), and children of active duty or retired enlisted personnel, are eligible to apply for interest-free loans and grants through the MOAA Scholarship Fund. Applicants must be less than 24 years old when applying, have a minimum 3.0 GPA, and be attending or planning to attend an accredited 2-or 4-year educational institution as a full-time student. Students attending a military academy are not eligible. The application closes on March 1 at noon EST.
