Jim is from Hermitage, Penna., and was drafted into the Army in 1956 and was honorably discharged in 1958. A friend who attended the Citadel taught him close order drill using a broom for a rifle. With this advantage, he was selected as squad leader during infantry Basic and Advanced Individual Training.

Individual Training he was assigned to the 3rd U.S. Infantry, "the Old Guard" at Fort Myer, Va.

He was selected to join the honor guard company whose three platoons include the Honor Guard, casket bearers, or firing party and drill team. He chose the drill team.

One day he saw a soldier in dress blues going to the head of the chow line.

"I didn't even know the army had dress blues," he said.

He learned that the soldier was a guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. He immediately decided that he had to go for that.

He ultimately was selected to become a Sentinel at the Tomb of the Unknowns, sometimes call be "Tomb Guard of the Unknown Soldier."

After practicing constantly with some of his friends who were tomb guards, he was given the opportunity. While some of those selected never made it to the tomb, Jim made it after just a couple weeks. Guards were usually first put out early or late in the day when there were few spectators at the tomb. Jim's first call came for the noon changing of the guard, before the biggest crowd of the day.

"I got through the first change okay. But when I was standing at the end doing the 21 second count, I heard a noise. My hand was trembling so much that the bayonet was rattling."

He managed to get through it all without screwing up.

"From that point on, I had the best duty the United States Army had to offer."

People often ask Jim how he got to be a tomb guard. He explains that the army selects soldiers who fit a defined profile – certain height, military bearing, attitude, and such. Of course only a tiny fraction of those who fit it are selected. The all volunteer army today, has a difficult time finding soldiers to serve in the Old Guard, yes there are females serving as Sentinels.

One of his last duties as a Sentinel was at the interment of the Unknown Soldier from World War II and the Korean War. Jim was instrumental in forming The Society of the Honor Guard – Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and has served as its president.

Jim is a retired banker and lives in Hermitage. His presentation gave incites in to what the duties of a Sentinel entailed and his experiences with the Old Guard. It was extremely interesting and often humorous. He emphasized the importance of the duty and how honored and rewarding it was to serve as a Sentinel at the Tomb.

Unfortunately, that has not been our experience in our own country, children allowed to climb on memorial statues, crowds have to be told to be quiet. Perhaps because the experience in our country has been so different, the sacrifices were so far away that here is no real connection. Not everyone can have the same experience as Mr. Cardoman, but we can all teach those around us the importance of these types of memorials and true reverence for them.

House and Senate leaders in Congress are about to begin resolving the differences in their respective versions of the annual defense bill. The decisions they make will affect your earned benefits.

The defense bill carries many of MOAA's most pressing priorities this year and every year, so this is likely the last chance to draw the line in the sand on these big issues until next year. As with each year, TRICARE benefits are always on the table as a potential way to save money at the expense of active duty families and military retirees and their families. This yea is no exception.

MOAA needs your help to stop a harmful Senate proposal to renege on their promise to grandfather existing TRICARE beneficiaries from new fees.

The Senate's health care proposals would give the Department of Defense unfettered access to treat TRICARE fees as a way to fund other benefits, and frankly, sometimes DOD hasn't been friendly to the needs of the retired military.

You'll be sending the suggested message to your elected officials to reject this noxious proposal. The more our congressional legislators know how concerned we are the likely they will support the MOAA TRICARE proposition.

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Army Doctor Will Make History During His 2019 Voyage Into Space[©] — Parents are MSVC members

The Army has sent its doctors to far flung places all over the globe, but next year, one physician will go where no others have traveled.

Lt. Col. Andrew Morgan, an emergency physician at Brooke Army Medical Center in Texas and NASA astronaut, is set be the first Army doctor in space. NASA will launch him to the International Space Station in July 2019.

"I'll be taking Army history, military medicine and this supportive community with me," Morgan said in an Army news release. "I'm hugely honored to represent all of that."

Morgan's journey began in 2011 when he saw a NASA announcement seeking the next astronaut class. He didn't believe he had the right background, but applied anyway.

The selection process, which included extensive interviews, medical testing and language aptitude testing, lasted 18 months. There were 120 candidates interviewed, according to NASA. Morgan was selected from the final pool of eight candidates in 2013.

For the past five years, he underwent extensive flight and space-walking training in addition to studying Russian, robotics, and space stations systems and maintenance. Morgan also learned about spacesuit development and injuries. Before his flight, he will undergo in-depth refresher training.

The 2019 voyage to the International Space Station will be Morgan's first official mission. He'll make the trek alongside Italian astronaut Luca Parmitano and Russian cosmonaut Aleksandr Skvortsov. Aboard the International Space Station, he'll join American astronaut Christina Koch and Russian cosmonaut Sergey Ryzhikov.

The Army Medical Corps officer cites his military experience and training as keys to his success.

"At the core, I was selected as an astronaut because they saw a unique set of skills," Morgan said. "Everything I brought to the table was given to me by the Army—my undergraduate and graduate education, residency, and operational experiences."

Brig. Gen. George Appenzeller, commanding general of Brooke Army Medical Center, said in the Army release that he is thrilled to work with Morgan from space.


