However, one important detail was missing: **The husband never had his wife sign the card allowing her access to the safety deposit box.** After his death, it took months of correspondence and legal action before she was able to obtain the papers that she needed to continue the life she had envisioned as a surviving spouse who was prepared.

Being a military surviving spouse is never easy, and even though we might think we are prepared for the future, unexpected circumstances and questions arise that we must be prepared to answer.

Keep this type of information at home, use a safe box and both spouses need to know where the key is.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS – Rod Hosler

The president signed the Comprehensive Toxic Exposure Reform known as the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics of 2022 or the PACT Act as it is known into law at the White House on 10 August. This monumental bill marked the end of a long legislative road to comprehensive toxic exposure reform. The PACT Act sets to expand health care coverage to millions of veterans will benefit from the MOAA-supported legislation. The bill's passage came as part of a combined effort from MOAA and more than 60 other veterans service organizations, alongside veterans and their families, other advocates and advocacy groups, and a bipartisan group of legislators from both chambers.

This bill adds nearly two dozen conditions to a list of ailments presumed connected to toxic exposure by the VA; while the legislation includes a timetable for this change, the president announced at the signing the VA will move to make these changes immediately. The bill also expands VA research into burn pitrelated illnesses and improves VA's screening process for those illnesses. Veterans can start filing claims now for PACT Act benefits.

MOAA continues to actively advocate for legislation to better the condition of America's military and their families regardless of rank, branch of service, or component. However, one might ask why it took so long! Progress is being made but it is a slow process. 
